## **Migraine**

#### A. David Rothner, M.D.

Dr. Rothner is a member of the Section of Pediatric Neurology and Pediatric Epilepsy at The Children's Hospital, and also of the Department of Neurology. He specializes in pediatric neurology, headache and neurofibromatosis. Active in clinical research, Dr. Rothner has participated in more than 80 clinical trials addressing pediatric and adolescent headache, seizures, Tourette syndrome, ADHD and neurofibromatosis. He is boardcertified in pediatrics, psychiatry and neurology, with special competence in child neurology. A fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics and of the American Academy of Neurology, Dr. Rothner is a member of the American Association for the Study of Headache, the Child Neurology Society and the Professors of Child Neurology. A graduate of the University of Illinois College of Medicine, he served pediatric residencies at Presbyterian-St. Luke Hospital in Chicago and then Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, staying on for a special pediatric neurology fellowship at its Neurological Institute. He served on the advisory boards of the Epilepsy Foundation of America, the Association for Children with Learning Disabilities and the National Neurofibromatosis Association. Dr. Rothner has authored numerous articles, book chapters and abstracts on migraine and other pediatric neurology topics.

### **Nocturnal Enuresis**

## Michael L. Macknin, M.D.

Dr. Macknin is chairman of the Department of General Pediatrics at The Children's Hospital at The Cleveland Clinic, and Professor of Pediatrics at Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine of Case Western Reserve University. Dr. Macknin heads the Pediatric Enuresis Clinic. A board-certified pediatrician, Dr. Macknin's specialty interests include general pediatric consulting, injury prevention and common cold research. He has published articles on enuresis, the common cold, otitis media, pharyngitis, teething, infant sleep and injury prevention. Dr. Macknin graduated from The Ohio State University and Harvard Medical School. He did his internship and residency at Massachusetts General Hospital, and his fellowship and outpatient chief residency at Boston Children's Hospital Medical Center. Dr. Macknin has served as a reviewer for Pediatrics, The Journal of Pediatrics, Clinical Pediatrics and the Journal of the American Medical Association. He is a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Ambulatory Pediatric Association and the Northern Ohio Pediatric Association.

### **Otitis Media**

## Camille Sabella, M.D.

Dr. Sabella, a member of the Section of Pediatric Infectious Diseases in The Children's Hospital at The Cleveland Clinic, specializes in all aspects of outpatient and inpatient pediatric infections. Dr. Sabella serves as vicechairman of Medical Student Education for the Division of Pediatrics and is an associate professor of pediatrics at Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine of Case Western Reserve University. Board-certified in pediatric infectious diseases and general pediatrics, he is a fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics. Dr. Sabella's research interests include immunity in transplant recipients and viral infections, and he has published on topics such as pneumococcal infections, sternal wound infections, varicella-zoster infections and endocarditis. Dr. Sabella is director of the annual Cleveland Clinic Pediatric Board Review Symposium and coeditor of The Cleveland Clinic Intensive Review of Pediatrics. A graduate of Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, Dr. Sabella completed his pediatric residency at Children's Hospital Medical Center of Akron, then served his pediatric infectious diseases fellowship at Stanford University School of Medicine. He is a member of the Infectious Diseases Society of America and the Pediatric Infectious Diseases Society.
